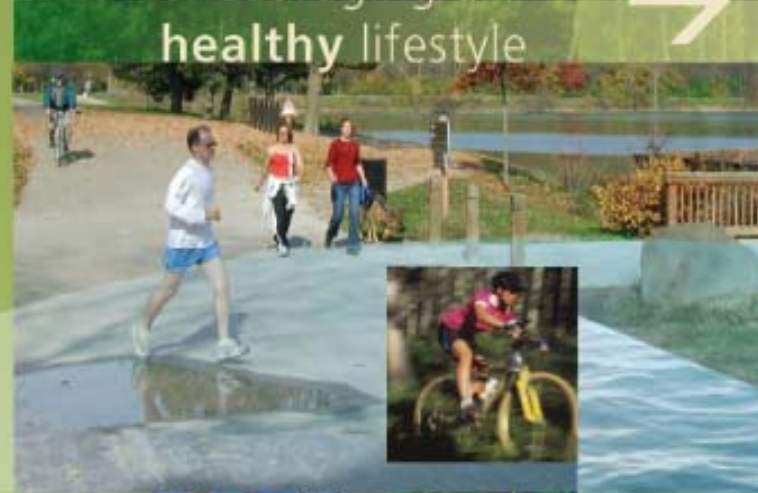

## Darby Creek Trail

This trail runs each side of Big Darby Creek, a State and National Scenic River in Prairie Oaks Metro Park connecting with Darby Bend Lake. Length: 4.6 miles  
Type: Crushed Gravel

## Heritage Trail

The Heritage Rail Trail follows an old abandoned rail line and extends from Main Street in Hilliard to Cemetery Pike near Plain City. Length: 7 miles  
Type: Paved Surface

## Scioto Trail

This greenway travels through the heart of downtown Columbus following along the Scioto River. Four segments of the trail are complete. Length: 7.5 miles  
Type: Paved Surface

## Olentangy Trail

This scenic trail weaves users throughout the Olentangy greenway corridor, connecting the communities of Worthington, Columbus and OSU together. It begins in Worthington Hills Park and ends at Confluence Park in Downtown Columbus. Length: 14 miles  
Type: Paved Surface

## I-670 Trail

This trail begins at Ft. Hayes Cleveland Ave and winds east along I-670, following Leonard Avenue, crossing Nelson & Fifth Avenues and ending at Airport Drive, near Ohio Dominican University. It connects to the Alum Creek Greenway Trail at Nelson Road.

## Alum Creek Trail

This scenic trail weaves users throughout the Alum Creek greenway corridor, connecting the communities of Westerville, Columbus and Bexley together. Three sections are open: North, from Westerville to Easton Way; Central, from Nelson Park to Livingston Ave.; South, from Three Creeks Park to Alum Creek Drive. Length: 15 miles  
Type: Paved Surface.

## Blacklick Trail

This scenic trail weaves users throughout the Blacklick Creek greenway corridor. Two sections are open: Middle, from Pickerington Ponds to Shannon Road.; Southern, through Three Creeks Park. Length: 8 miles  
Type: Paved Surface
